

Directions to the library:

As viewers listen to the soothing audio, they're treated to smoothly animated scenes featuring the otherworldly artwork of Feyruna Fairy Forest, a casual game created by Jochen Kaercher Gamedesign. Jochen Kaercher is an experienced game developer based in Germany. After launching his company in 1999, he created several freeware and shareware offerings for the PC. Kaercher is now developing more ambitious titles aimed at

***Free USB Protection**

A.C. Element Company has made available the free version of MyUSBOnly for individual users. MyUSBOnly Free 2007 is a Windows security application that prevents data theft through your computer's USB ports. While USB ports have made computing much more convenient, they also introduce a security threat that could subject many computer users to identity theft and data theft. MyUSBOnly thwarts attempts to gain access to your computer via your USB ports.

New features for MyUSBOnly Free 2007 are:

- Syslog entries for copied, modified, deleted files/folders
- Firewall-like feature to allow/deny inserted USB devices

It acts as something similar to a firewall that monitors the USB ports for any storage device connected to the protected computer. Simply create a whitelist of all of the USB devices you want to allow on your computer. The program will recognize each of your flash drives, external disk drives, MP3 players, and other USB devices and add them to its list of accepted hardware once they are authorized by the user. When your list is complete, the software will then check the whitelist of allowed devices by USB brand (if you want to allow a certain USB brand) or by serial number (for specific USB devices you want to allow) depending on the settings desired by the user.

The software also has reporting features, such as e-mail notifications, each time somebody attaches a USB device to your desktop or laptop. MyUSBOnly also maintains a security log of all attempts to gain access to your computer via USB flash drives, iPods, card-readers, or any USB hardware. Modified and copied files are now included in the log entries and can be configured to send all log information to syslog. Use syslog viewers such as Kiwi Syslog Daemon TM to view all the log entries from one or more computers in the network, allowing administrators to be able to manage and audit

security.

There is an option to hide the software from the user, by not displaying any tray icons at all, so it silently works in the background without the user even knowing it's there. MyUSBOnly makes it easy to lock down your USB ports to protect this critical vulnerability on your desktop or laptop.

MyUSBOnly runs under Windows 2000/XP/2003/Vista/Server 2008, Download the software from our website <<http://www.myusbonly.com/usb/free.php>>. DealsGuy note: My proofreader noted some contradictions in the Web site information so look closely and clarify what you don't understand by trying the trial version before buying.

***Like Jigsaw Puzzles? Try This One!**

They claim, "It is even possible to see and feel the cardboard thickness.", but I am skeptical about feeling the cardboard thickness on the screen."

Gaia Dream Creation Inc. released its new 3D jigsaw puzzle game, and a puzzle screensaver named "Gaia 3D Puzzle" and "Gaia 3D Puzzle Screensaver." This 3D jigsaw puzzle game allows players to play jigsaw puzzles on their computer by selecting their favorite images and the number of pieces. The 3D view creates a totally immersive playing experience like a real puzzle game.

Gaia 3D Puzzle allows players to play with almost any images found on the Internet. Unlike other computer puzzle games, Gaia 3D Puzzle is in 3D. Players can see their puzzle as a real jigsaw puzzle and the pieces are as real as true jigsaw pieces. The pieces are not pre-cut image shapes. They are generated from advanced mathematic procedures to show the exact look and feel of true jigsaw pieces. It is even possible to see and feel the cardboard thickness. Players are able to play puzzles from 9 to 2000 pieces. Children can play and enjoy the same puzzles that adults play, but with less pieces.

A selection of 4 different piece shapes is available which increases or decreases the difficulty level. It's also possible to modify the degree of distortion in the pieces, meaning the pieces can all look the same, which is harder to play, or all look different, which is easier to play.

The puzzle game and screensaver are available in English and French for Windows 2000/XP/Vista. The puzzle game (Gaia 3D Puzzle) is \$29.95 USD and the screensaver (Gaia 3D Puzzle Screensaver) is \$14.95 USD.

Get Ready for XP and Vista Service Packs 925

Service Pack 1 for Windows Vista and Service Pack 3 for Windows XP are going to be released soon, perhaps even by the time you are reading this. I recommend not being one of the first on your block to install either of the new service packs. Let others discover any problems with the installation of the final versions of the Service Packs!

What are service packs? They are a compilation of all critical updates released since the initial release of an operating system or the last service pack. They often contain new features or enhancements as well. Service Pack 2 for Windows XP contained a number of security improvements and was arguably the most significant Service pack ever released. I think it was only because of the negative publicity Microsoft was receiving over weak security that led them to release it as a free Service Pack and not "Windows XP Second Edition" which they would have charged us for. You will not see any major changes or additions to XP in Service Pack 3 but you will still want to install it. Service Pack 1 for Vista is reported to have sped up some aspects of the operating system.

There is an article at <http://support.microsoft.com/kb/935796> listing 11 programs that are blocked, do not run, or have a "loss of functionality" after the installation of Service pack 1 for Vista. Three of the programs listed are Zone Alarm, BitDefender AntiVirus or Internet Security and the New York Times Reader. Check the list before you install the service pack. Personally I will wait at least one week (maybe more) to make sure there are not any other problems that are affected by the final release of either new service pack. If you have been installing all Microsoft updates as they were released, you already have most of the service pack installed.

Here are some general guidelines for the installation of any service pack:

1. Run complete scans of your computer for viruses and spyware. A majority of the problems people encountered while installing Windows XP Service Pack 2 were caused by viruses and/or spyware on their computer. Service packs replace or update a number of system files. You want to make sure your computer is free of any malware.

2. Fix any hardware or software problems. If you are experiencing frequent lockups or system crashes, or extremely slow performance, resolve those problems before trying to install a service pack. Many people assume the installation of a service pack will clear up problems they may be experiencing. This usually is not the case. This is another frequent cause of service pack installations failing or causing more problems.

3. Create a System Restore point. If you found any viruses or spyware delete all of your old Restore Points and then create a new one. If you have a problem and use a System Restore point prior to the time you removed any viruses or spyware, guess what happens? That's right; you reload the viruses and/or spyware! Instructions on deleting System Restore points are at the end of this article.

4. If you installed a beta version of a service pack, uninstall that version before you install the final service pack.

5. NEVER attempt to abort the installation of a service pack (or any program). If you have started the installation and then decide you do not want to continue, allow the installation to complete; reboot the computer; and then uninstall the service pack (or program).

Follow the steps below if you need (or want) to delete all System Restore points:

Windows XP

1. Click the Start Button.

2. From the Start menu click Control panel.
3. Click on “Switch to Classic View” in the upper left portion of the Control Panel window.
4. In Control Panel double-click the “System” Icon.
5. Click the “System Restore” tab.
6. Check the box next to “Turn off System Restore on all drives”.
7. Click “Apply” at the bottom right corner.
8. Click “Yes” in the warning box asking if you want to turn off system restore.
9. Click “OK” and close all windows.
10. Reboot the computer to clear all System Restore points.
11. To re-enable system restore repeat the above steps; this time removing the check in the box next to “Turn off System Restore on all drives”.
11. Reboot Again.

Windows Vista


1. Click the Start Button.

2. From the Start menu click Control panel.
3. Click on “Classic View” in the upper left portion of the Control Panel window
4. In Control Panel double-click the “System” Icon.
5. On the Left of the System properties window you will see a list of Tasks, click on the “System protection” link.
6. Click “Continue” on the ‘User Account Control’ box if it appears.
7. In the System protection window remove the “check” mark for the drive you want to disable system restore on. A message will now appear asking: ‘Are you sure you want to turn System restore off’.
8. Press the “Turn System restore Off” button. System Restore will now be turned off permanently on that particular drive.
9. Click “OK” and close all windows.
10. Reboot the computer to clear all System Restore points.

To re-enable system restore repeat the above steps, but click the box next to the drive you require system restore to monitor (a check will appear in the box), then click the Apply button and system restore will resume monitoring the drive.

Security Update

- **Megapixel Count:** Megapixels measure resolution, or how much detail your camera can capture. Each megapixel consists of 1 million pixels (the tiny colored dots that combine to make up a complete photo).

To decide how many megapixels you need when buying a digital camera, consider what size photos you'd like to print. No more than 5MP are necessary to print 8- x 10-inch images. With a 6MP camera, you can print quality 11- x 14-inch photos. An 8MP camera is capable of producing poster-sized prints. These are only guidelines, however, because your printer also plays a role in how well your photos turn out. Printers with a higher resolution (expressed in dpi, or dots per inch) will generally produce higher-quality prints than printers with a lower resolution.

- **Size It Up:** Finding a high-definition television set that works in your room is a crucial part of your purchase. A small room and a couch near the TV means you should invest in a fairly small HDTV; a larger space with plenty of seating for friends and family requires a bigger screen. Use the three-to-five rule to calculate your optimal screen size. Measure the distance, in feet, from your TV's location to your viewing position. Multiply that number by three, and then by five. Those numbers represent the minimum and maximum screen sizes, measured in inches diagonally, for that space. For example, a 10-foot span from your TV to sofa will accommodate screens between 30 and 50 inches.
- **Medusa Goes To The Salon:** The cords, cables, and wires behind an entertainment center can be tough to keep clean. Oftentimes, they're tangled together and so close to the wall that the only the cat dares to venture back there. Prevention goes a long way here: Use cable ties, wraps, or guards to keep things organized and free of dust. When it comes time to clean, first unplug your TV and any other devices from the wall to avoid a shock. (This may cause some of your components to reboot, so it's a good idea to jot down any special settings so you can reset them later.) Use a rag to remove as many dust bunnies as possible. Finally, use a vacuum with an extension hose to carefully sweep underneath and around the cables. ☹

Seems that PC's are going to keep us busy in one way or another. We all enjoy using them but it isn't easy keeping them up-to-date and secure. We'll try to help make this a little less painful with some tips and tools.

- **Windows Update, Microsoft's online updater for Windows, is your first line of defense. Go to Start > Control Panel > Security Center and make sure that Automatic Updates are set to "on". While you're there, make sure that the Windows Firewall is set to "on" too.**
- **Secunia's Online Software Scanner and the resident Secunia Personal Software Inspector are tools that will scan your PC and alert you to the software applications that are out-of-date and/or in need of security patches. They will also give you a 'menu' of tools that will assist you in doing updates or deletions. And they're FREE! Visit www.secunia.com for more information.**
- **Security blogs, such as "Zero Day" at ZDNet and "Security Fix" at The Washington Post, are excellent sources of breaking news on the latest software vulnerabilities and patches. Adding them to your RSS reader is a great way to stay up-to-date on what's happening out there.**
