

### Directions to the library:

From the NY State Thruway: Exit at Route 57 (exit 38). After the tollbooth, turn right on Route 57 towards the Village of Liverpool. At Tulip Street, turn right and go one block. Liverpool Library will be on the left side at the corner of Tulip and Second Street.

From Interstate 81 North: Take the Liverpool Exit to Onondaga Lake Pkwy (Rte 370). In the Village of Liverpool, follow Rte 370 West (called Second St. in the Village) to the corner of Tulip St. Liverpool Library will be on the left.

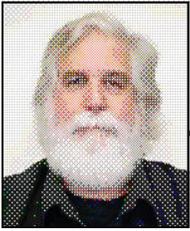

**Chrome/Firefox Tip**  
If you use Chrome or Firefox, you can pin a tab by right-clicking it and selecting Pin tab. The web page in the pinned tab will automatically open each time you open a new browser window.

**Backup Network Settings**  
With Windows 7 it is extremely easy to backup your wireless network settings, to save for the just in case times. Even though setting up a wireless network in Windows 7 is very easy, there are still things like a security key that you have to remember and type in manually. Therefore I like to save my wireless network settings and import them back in whenever I need them.

**Miracast**  
It lets two devices that have Wi-Fi in them talk to each other without having to go through your internet network. And unlike AirPlay, it will work with disparate brands and platforms. So ideally, your Samsung phone would be able to talk to your LG TV.

**Wireless displays**  
Wireless displays are pretty amazing things. You can output display and audio from smartphones, laptops and desktops to larger monitors. Most modern computers and smartphones include some kind of support for it. Linux, iOS, PCs and most Android devices with Jelly Bean or later versions support the feature. WiDi, AirPlay and Miracast are terms to study.

**Youtube Video Link Customization**  
You can easily create links that go directly to a specific time in a YouTube video -- ideal for emailing or sharing on social media. To do this, just add `&t=#m#s` to the end of the video's URL, replacing the # signs with the number of minutes and seconds you want to link to. For example, the link <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=wKF-TO2HEuQ&t=15m30s> takes you to the 15 minute and 30 second mark on the latest MakeUseOf podcast video.

**VPN**

**Ctrl + F**  
When in IE and most other browsers a little known browser keyboard shortcut, Ctrl + F, will open a "Find" box. Fill in any word or phrase that you want to find in the active web page. (For Apple users the keys are Command + f)

**Automatic Plant Watering**  
Instructables user threads a very fine needle, and then punctures the bottom of a zip-loc bag with a threaded needle. The needle has to be straight and fine for this to work, and once punctured the thread hangs out of the bag but the needle rests on the inside. This way the needle isn't in the way, and the thread serves as a wick that water can travel down. Fill the (now leaky) baggie with water, rest the baggie inside the plant's pot (or anywhere near it, as long as it's above the soil and the wick is touching the soil), and you're done.

On Androids, hold the Power and Volume Down buttons at the same time. The image is saved to the "Captured Images" folder in your Gallery app. That only works in Android 4.0 and higher, though.

# Genealogy Workshop

But the secret to getting the most out of **Fulton History** is best outlined in Dennis Hogan's presentation:

and scroll down till you see **Fulton History Website** PDF hyperlink. Skip to page 16 for the details of Fulton History and search methods (there is lots of interesting material in the first 15 pages but the real meat starts on page 16). The other great source of guidance is on FultonHistory itself, just click on "FAQ\_HELP\_INDEX" in the upper right corner.

- One point that Dennis addresses later in his presentation is finding out which papers are included on the Fulton History site. I think it's important to look at this information up front so that you know the scope of the site. Go to [fultonhistory.com FAQ\\_HELP\\_INDEX](http://fultonhistory.com/FAQ_HELP_INDEX) for "how-to" get the list of papers and their date range. Here is what you will find: <http://goo.gl/xsEQLh>  
That is the first step; Next, click on the link at the very top of the page that says "Download this index as a Microsoft Excel file". Open the downloaded file and save it to your computer for current use. (Remember that Tom adds newspapers all the time so you may have to download an updated list a week or month from now).
- Tom gives us another challenge here as he has the newspaper list organized (?) apparently by the date that he added the particular paper. This means that you will still have to do a further search for the paper or area of interest to you. My suggestion is to use the "Find" function of the spreadsheet program and insert the area location (i.e., Erie) and select "find all". Expand the results box and look at the cell number listing to find all the possible papers in that county, else you may miss some (ex., Onondaga appears on lines 399 and 608, much separated from all other listings). Of course, you can use the Find function to pinpoint an exact newspaper name too.  
As you will note, the date range is included for each newspaper, a quick guide to the likelihood of finding data you need. Also included is a state map labeling all the counties and the number of newspapers, along with an alpha list of the counties that is clickable to take you to a NYS site that gives brief details about a county.
- Now back to SEARCHING! We talked at length last November about Boolean searches and how efficient and accurate they can be. But the other techniques can be very useful, too.

- john hogan canandaigua, and "All of the words" will yield responses with all of the words in the search box even though they may be scattered on the page.
- john hogan canandaigua, and "Any of the words" will yield responses with any one of the words, but not necessarily all the words.
- "john hogan" canandaigua, and "All of the words" will yield responses with all of the words in the search box but john & hogan will be next to each other.
- "john hogan" -canandaigua, and "All of the words" will yield responses with john hogan but no occurrence of canandaigua.
- Fuzzy searching allows you to "compensate" for errors in typing, transcription or imaging by the transcriptionist. Search first without fuzzy, then try with a fuzzy factor of 1 and add progressively more fuzziness!
- Stemming is just the opposite of what it seems to say. Stemming actually adds to the words you search for (ex., hero, with stemming turned on finds heroes).
- Wildcards allow you to target your searches for "fuzziness", in a way.
  - ? [Matches](#) any single character.  
Example: *appl?* matches *apply* or *apple*.
  - \* [Matches](#) any number of characters.  
Example: *appl\** matches *application*
  - ~ [Stemming](#).  
Example: *apply~* matches *apply*, *applies*, *applied*.
  - % [Fuzzy search](#).  
Example: *ba%nana* matches *banana*, *bannana*.
  - # [Phonic search](#). Example: *#smith* matches *smith*, *smythe*.
  - & [Synonym search](#). Example: *fast&* matches *quick*.
  - ~ [Numeric range](#). Example: *12~24* matches *18*.
  - : [Variable term weighting](#). Example: *apple:4 w/5 pear:1*
- Displaying next (or previous) page of the newspaper:
  - > From the listings in results frame select the underlined listing (hyperlink) and copy it
  - > Open a new tab and open [fultonhistory](http://fultonhistory.com)
  - > Paste the copied hyperlink into the search box
  - > Adjust the four digit number, one up or down
  - > Select "exact phrase" and click search.
  - > Opening a new tab allows you to stay with the results of your original search (and basically- not lose your place)

## Filter Out Junk Email with Outlook 2010



I have used Outlook for my email since my first version of Office (97). I keep my junk email protection level at high and have Outlook disable links in messages considered to be phishing and warn me about suspicious domain names.

Outlook's junk email filter is designed to keep spam and junk from getting to the inbox. It is on by default and will place the junk in its own folder. One of the default options is to have Outlook automatically delete suspected junk but it only takes a second to open the junk folder and glance to be sure something wanted didn't end up there. I changed the filtering protection from the default level to high.

### Junk Email Options

To control Junk Email options while in Mail on Home tab in the Delete group click the down arrow by Junk. On the dialog box Options tab select the level of protection desired. Selecting No Automatic Filtering turns the junk email filter off but you can still block senders and that email goes into the Junk folder.



The Safe Senders tab lists email addressed that you trust and have noted so. Email addresses and/or domain names in this list are never considered junk, regardless of message content.

The Safe Recipients tab lets you add specify an email address you use for a mailing or distribution list. All email sent to that address is never considered junk. I use this for my Corel PaintShop Pro Groups.

All email from addresses or domain names on the Blocked Senders list are automatically considered junk.

When the babies reached maturity they were sent to breed and become part of the animal families at the Virginia Zoo (Norfolk, Virginia) and the Zoo Boise (Boise, Idaho). Subsequently, the Firefox Live website was retired.

**Add Senders to Safe Senders List**

I mentioned that I keep the filter set to high so occasionally Outlook flags message I want as junk. That is not a problem. For an occasional email I simply drag it from the Junk to the Inbox. If the email is from someone I expect to continue to receive email from I add the address to the Safe Senders List. Simply select the email in the Junk folder and in the Junk drop down menu (Home tab Delete group) select Not Junk and respond as required.

**Block a Sender**

Conversely a few times email slips through from someone I do not know and I don't want to continue receiving messages from them. In this case select the message an in the Junk drop down menu select Block Sender.


